Differing patterns of Viking migration and settlement in East Anglia:

an analysis of Scandinavian and Anglo-Scandinavian place-names in their landscape context

Research objectives:

- to explore different phases and patterns of Viking settlement in East Anglia;
- to analyse Scandinavian and Anglo-Scandinavian place-names as a means of identifying different groups of Viking settlers;
- to test this analysis against other forms of evidence;
- to explore the nature of the Viking migration process.


Surface geology


Possible Viking period coastline







Thorp place-names - soil-types







Anglo-Scandinavian place-names in '-ton' - geology






Thorp place-names in East Anglia, plus parishes with 'thorp(e)' names




